

From the Chairman's Desk

Chronic kidney disease is growing at an alarming rate in India, and Telangana is no exception. Vitamin and other nutritional deficiencies of the mother during pregnancy may cause smaller kidney volumes at birth. According to the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), 28% of the children born in India weigh less than 2.5 kg at birth. Consanguinity and genetic inbreeding increase the risk of congenital anomalies of the kidney and urinary tract. Poverty, poor sanitation, pollutants, water contamination, and known and unknown nephrotoxins may also cause kidney disease.

In addition, uncontrolled hypertension and diabetes are major contributors to the growing number of kidney patients in the country. By 2030, India is expected to have the world's largest population of patients with diabetes. Because of challenges in access to primary health centres, and to adequate medical support and care, over 50% of patients with kidney disease are first diagnosed when the disease has already reached the chronic stage.

Lifelong dialysis or kidney transplants are the only options for CKD patients. What is of particular concern is that, in India, an estimated 90% of patients requiring kidney treatment die because they cannot afford the treatment, or — as it often happens in rural India — because treatment is simply not available. As dialysis in private facilities can cost anywhere between Rs.20,000 to Rs.40,000 per month, even amongst those who do start the treatment, 60% are unable to continue for financial reasons.

It is heartening to note that the Government of India and the Government of Telangana have included dialysis under their health insurance schemes — *Ayushman Bharat* and *Aarogyasri*, respectively. These schemes take care of the dialysis needs of below-poverty-line (BPL) patients. However, families of lower middle class CKD patients, who are just marginally above the poverty line, often find themselves in a grave dilemma: they can neither afford commercial dialysis, nor can they avail of the benefits of government schemes.

The Bhagwan Mahavir Jain Relief Foundation Trust (BMJRFT) was set up twelve years ago (in June 2009) by sixteen like-minded Jains. Its immediate objective was to take care of the needs of this category of patients, that is, the lower middle class. The Trust started on a modest note: each of the trustees contributed Rs.1,000 to

subsidise 16 dialysis sessions of 6 patients affected by kidney disease. From this small beginning in July 2009, the Trust has come a long way — today, it conducts about 500 dialysis sessions *every day*. It collects a nominal amount of Rs.300 per session from APL patients (against Rs.1500 – Rs.4000 charged by private hospitals). This charge has not been revised upward in more than twelve years, though the cost of treatment has increased several-fold. It is gratifying to note that the efforts of the Trust have resulted in a saving of over Rs. XXX crores to our patients. The story of this fascinating journey can be found elsewhere in this monograph.

Today, when we celebrate the completion of one million dialysis sessions, we re-dedicate ourselves to provide affordable healthcare to the economically weaker sections of society in India. In closing, allow me to say that this incredible journey of the Bhagwan Mahavir Trust would not have been possible without the generous donations of our well-wishers, the hard work of our trustees and their spouses, the tireless efforts of our sincere and dedicated staff, and above all, the unfailing support of the State Government and a succession of Health Secretaries. I wish to place on record our sincere appreciation and gratitude for their contribution to our success.



SECRETARY'S REPORT

 $\mathbf{P}^{\mathrm{ASSION}}$ to compassion, that is what our journey has been. And our eventful saga — from a mere sixteen dialyses to a whopping one million — could fill a thousand pages at least!

In a nutshell, the formation of the Bhagwan Mahavir Jain Relief Foundation Trust (BMJRFT) was the culmination of the ideas and desires of a handful of close friends. The inspiration came from various quarters, and through various individuals, as if Divine Will itself was driving us from within. I was introduced to Shri Nirup Kothari, who was managing the Neminath Foundation, which operated dialysis centres in Mumbai. I was on my way to the holy Palitana Tirtha, along with my friend Hemendra Sheth. Similar dialysis support activities in various parts of India came to the notice of my brother, Gautam bhai.



The BMJRFT's plan of supporting dialysis treatment was also perfectly timed: it coincided with the State Government floating open tenders for the provision of dialysis treatment to below-poverty-line (BPL) patients under its flagship 'Aarogyasri' healthcare scheme.


Based on our request to provide space in a Government Hospital to setup our very first dialysis centre, the erstwhile government of Andhra Pradesh allotted us space in King Koti Government Hospital free of rent. However, the Government order came with a pre-condition that the Trust had to extend its dialysis services to BPL patients, and that these patients would always be given priority over other patients. In keeping with our commitment, the Trust has provided over six lakh dialysis treatments to BPL patients under the *Aarogyasri* scheme. Not only in King Koti Centre where rent-free space was provided by the government, in every one of our seven other centres, BPL patients get priority. This is entirely in line with our original approach and philosophy of service to the neediest.

As detailed elsewhere in this book, within just a few years of the Trust beginning its activities, the demand for dialysis treatment far exceeded our capacity. The flow of patients looking for affordable but quality treatment $\frac{1}{2}$




To this day, not one of our dialysis centres have turned down a patient who approached us for treatment. Such is our record of 'no denial'.

The global kidney disease picture



Year-wise dialyses (2009-2021)



Kidney disease is non-communicable, and currently affects nearly 900 million people worldwide. One in ten adults has chronic kidney disease (CKD). The global burden of CKD is increasing, and is projected to become the 5th most common cause of years of life lost globally by 2040. Some key facts:

- 10% of the population worldwide is affected by chronic kidney disease (CKD) with over 2 million people worldwide receiving treatment with dialysis or a kidney transplant to stay alive, yet this number may only represent 10% of people who actually need treatment to live.
- Many people cannot afford treatment at all, resulting in the death of over 1 million people annually from untreated kidney failure.
- In people aged 65 through 74 worldwide, it is estimated that one in five men, and one in four women, have CKD.
- Chronic kidney disease can be treated. With early diagnosis and treatment, it is possible to slow or stop the progression of kidney disease.
- India has roughly 30,000 dialysis machines and 2 lakh dialysis patients. These figures continue to increase every year.
- Telangana has about 2,200 dialysis machines and 13,000 dialysis patients.
- In Hyderabad alone, there are 1,800 machines and 10,000 patients.

continued to rise, encouraging us to put in place a network of centres across Hyderabad and Secunderabad. The guiding factor was to take dialysis treatment as close as possible to the patients, so that they could save time, money and effort in accessing the facilities.

In mid-2012, our long-term association and friendship with Shri Vikramdev Rao and Smt Meera Rao, owners of the well-known Ramdevrao Hospital, resulted in the Trust obtaining the required space and infrastructure in the Hospital at Kukatpally to start its dialysis facility with twelve machines. This was our second centre, after King Koti. Two expansions followed in subsequent years, and the centre now has thirty-nine machines. The Mahavir Hospital, a prestigious hospital of the Jain community, was our next location (Masab Tank), where we now have our largest set-up with sixty-one machines.

By 2016, we were much better prepared and equipped to meet the ever-rising demand for dialyses. In a unique partnership of two minority communities and a social organisation, we set up a new dialysis facility at the Guru Nanak Medical Centre, Secunderabad, with a total financial help of over Rs.140 lakhs from the Rotary Club of Hyderabad Deccan. Our most recent new centre was inaugurated in Alair, a town 75 km from Hyderabad, with ten machines. It is worth noting that the Covid-19 lockdown did not deter us from completing the preparatory work for this facility, which opened within a month after the lockdown was lifted. The cooperation of the local authorities played a crucial role.

Today, in our second decade, we are offering quality and affordable dialysis in eight centres. Our current strength of 189 machines allows us to treat over 900 patients (about 13,000 dialysis sessions per month). The Trust also provides key medicines at a reduced cost. With an eye on general health promotion and disease prevention, we started a physiotherapy centre in Sultan Bazar (Hyderabad) for affordable physio-care.

Thursday, 14th October 2021, was a landmark day: the Trust completed its *one millionth* dialysis since its inception in 2009. This souvenir gives you an overview of our memorable journey, with details and photos — from the birth of the Trust, through its important milestones from 2009 to 2021. Many a reader will surely recall how closely he or she has been associated with us on this remarkable mission of social service.

What lies behind us and what lies before us are tiny matters compared to what lies within us.

THE STORY OF THE STELLAR SIXTEEN

As the saying goes, where there is a will, there is a way. Today, as they celebrate their incredible record of one million dialyses, the Bhagwan Mahavir Dialysis Centres have become synonymous with low-cost treatment for chronic kidney disease in Hyderabad. How did it all begin? What divine force brought this small group together to form a Trust? How did a small idea gather momentum and attract the invaluable support of hundreds of generous donors? And last but not the least, what is dialysis after all?

On the following pages, two pioneers narrate how resolve, commitment, dedication — and the will to act — resulted in the extraordinary saga of the Bhagwan Mahavir Jain Relief Foundation Trust.


"It all started on a pilgrimage we made to *Ahichatra Tirtha*, hosted by my co-brother Shri Premchandji Ostwal," says Gautam Jain. Ahichatra is a famous Jain centre near Muradabad, in Uttar Pradesh. On the way, Gautam Jain overheard his co-traveller Shri Anand Marlecha (who was associated with a donations-based charitable trust in Bengaluru) talk about dialysis treatment on his phone. Like many, Gautam Jain was intrigued by this strange word: what is 'dialysis' after all? After further conversation with Shri Marlecha, and by the end of their journey, an 'inner voice' told Gautam Jain to explore the idea of starting a similar trust in Hyderabad. It was as if by Divine Will.

An Idea is Born

On his return, Gautam Jain lost no time in broaching the subject with Inder Chand Jain, Madan Lunawat and Satish Khivsara. Being closely associated with the prestigious 'Mahavir Hospital' as a trustee, Satish Khivsara knew about the issues that kidney patients face. He was aware of kidney transplants being performed by the famous nephrologist Dr. Sarbeswar Sahariah and Dr. Ram Bhoopal. The idea of a trust with a healthcare focus immediately appealed to everyone, and the four felt they were on to something truly worthwhile — a 'dialysis project'.

A little later, the word reached Shri Suresh Surana who instantly offered to join the 'team'; he knew the dialysis scenario only too well. His mother was suffering from kidney failure, and he would often accompany her for the dialysis sessions. He was also aware of the financial challenges of dialysis for middle-class and lower-middle-class patients. The sudden passing of his mother left Shri Surana with a certain resoluteness to give his

all to the project. At her funeral, Gautam Jain found himself sitting next to Shri Rikhab Parak; learning about the dialysis project, Shri Parak became keen on playing an active part in the philanthropic initiative that was fast crystallizing.

However, no one had yet sought specialist advice on dialysis treatment. Gautam Jain shared the plan with a dear friend, Dr. Nagendra Mahendra (an ENT specialist), who introduced him to Dr. Girish Narayan, a senior nephrologist in the city. Dr. Narayan offered valuable advice on how to take the plan forward, based on his experience at the Osmania Hospital. He also said that anything offered free would carry no value, and therefore suggested a minimum charge per dialysis treatment.

Advice continued to pour in. Dr. Rajender Jain Munoth explained the function of the kidneys in the human body, and the logistics of dialysis treatment. He added a word of caution: "It is very challenging to support such treatments for a lifetime, and if, at some point, you were to discontinue the charitable services, then it could have an undesirable, 'reverse' effect on you..." Dr. Munoth went on to suggest that, instead of dialysis treatments, a more practical initiative could be to consider helping children with heart surgeries, or maybe cataract treatments and the like, as they all only involve a one-time investment. However, in Gautam Jain's mind, the emerging magnitude of the challenge was nothing compared to the magnitude of the kidney disease problem for the disadvantaged classes of our society. Life is indeed dear to all living beings. It was a decisive point. "I had no plans of looking back on a journey that I had already started in my mind," says Jain, "When the going gets tough, the tough should get going."

The Spadework

The immediate job on hand was to look at how other charitable trusts—the one in Bengaluru, and the Neminath Trust in Mumbai—were conducting dialysis treatments. Everyone in the 'dialysis project' pitched in earnestly, calling up friends and acquaintances, looking for suggestions and general direction. One evening, Inder Chand Jain received a visit from Shri Neerup Kothari of the Neminath Trust (which runs dialysis services in Mumbai).

WHY DIALYSIS?

Kidneys. These are two bean-shaped organs located just below the rib cage, one on each side of our spine. They are among the most vital organs of the human body. The primary function of the kidney is to filter and purify the blood (about half a cup of blood every minute). Each kidney removes waste materials (as well as extra water and other chemicals not required by the body), which are then flushed out of the body in the form of urine.

Kidney failure is the condition where there is a significant reduction in the ability of the kidneys to filter and excrete waste products from the body.


Chronic kidney disease (CKD) is the gradual, progressive and irreversible loss of kidney function over several months to years. The kidney function decreases continuously, and eventually reaches a stage where the kidneys stop working altogether. CKD is a 'silent disease', and often goes unnoticed. Common symptoms may include generalized weakness, loss of appetite, nausea and vomiting, generalized swelling, high blood pressure, etc. Two important and common causes of CKD are diabetes and hypertension.

In the early stages of CKD, the patient needs appropriate medications and dietary modifications. There is no specific treatment which can cure this disease. One has to realize that as one gets older, the kidney function also decreases. Concomitant illnesses such as diabetes and hypertension, if uncontrolled, can contribute to faster and progressive decline of kidney function, along with age. When the disease progresses to an advanced stage (end-stage kidney disease), more than 90% of kidney function is lost (serum creatinine is usually more than 8-10 mg/dl). The only treatment options available at this stage are dialysis (hemodialysis and peritoneal dialysis) and kidney transplantation.

Dialysis is a filtering process to remove waste products and excess fluid from the body that may accumulate in the body when the kidney stops functioning. Dialysis is not a cure for CKD. In the advanced stages of CKD, the patient needs lifelong regular dialysis treatment. Two methods are used: *hemodialysis* and *peritoneal* dialysis. Hemodialysis is the most widely used form of dialysis. With the use of a special machine, waste products, excess fluid and salt are removed. Kidney transplantation is the most ideal treatment option and the only curative treatment for end-stage kidney disease.

Shown at right is a typical dialysis machine (top) and the flowchart of the dialysis procedure. Blood is pumped out of the patient's system (blue), toxins and excess water are removed, and the cleansed blood (red) is pumped back into the body. The dialyzer is the heart of the dialysis machine (see image at left). The special membranes inside the dialyzer do the actual work, filtering out the wastes while keeping the blood cells and protein, which are sent back into the circuit.

Dialysis needs to be performed in a designated dialysis centre, which has not only the machines, but an array of auxiliary equipment. Each dialysis session usually lasts about 3–4 hours; and 1–3 sessions are required per week, depending on the patient.



Barely able to conceal his excitement, Inder Jain called Gautam Jain to inform him about Shri Kothari's visit. Both Gautam Jain and Satish Khivsara reached Inder Jain's office in minutes, and listened eagerly to Shri Kothari explain how the entire 'system' functions. While Shri Kothari was extremely generous in sharing every single detail, he rounded up with a clear caveat: "If you are thinking about dialysis, remember that mere words and lofty thoughts will not suffice. You will need determined action."

The steepness of the task ahead was anything but a deterrent. Gautam Jain immediately called for an meeting at his residence to talk about the nuts and bolts of forming an institution. After hours of brainstorming with Inder Chand Jain, Satish Khivsara, Suresh Surana, Rikhab Parak, Ashok Kothari, Prakash Shrimal, and Shanti Bhai Shah, it was agreed that a trust should be set up, and the name, 'Bhagwan Mahavir Jain Relief Foundation Trust', emerged as a unanimous choice.

Another key decision was to have trustees from all sections of the Jain society. The core group thus called upon Shri Sunil Pahade and Shri Mahavir Patny (Digambar Samajh), Shri Swaroop Kothari, Shri Mahavir Chandji Alizar, Shri Dharmender Nahar, Shri Vinod Kimtee (Sthanak waasi), Shri Rajender Dugar and Shri HM Jain (Terapanti), and Shri Dhiraj Bhai Kapadia (Kutchi Samajh). Rikab Parak suggested the name of Shri Uttam Chand Ji Lunawat, who was himself a dialysis patient. Two of the invited people did not respond. In the next meeting, Inder Chand Jain was given the responsibility of drafting and registering the trust deed. The long-awaited dream thus became a reality in mid-2009. The Bhagwan Mahavir Jain Relief Foundation Trust was registered by Shri P.C. Shrimal, Gautam Chordia and Inder Chand Jain as Founder Trustees.

Cutting the Cost

The Trust was formed, but the acid test lay ahead. How does one go about starting a dialysis centre? What paraphernalia does one need, and how does one source it? Satish Khivsara and Gautam Jain were thus given the responsibility to consult the renowned nephrologist Dr. Sarbeswar Sahariah at the Mahavir Hospital, which was running a dialysis centre with 10 machines. Satish Khivsara recalls, "It was an eye-opening experience. Being

a good friend of mine, Dr. Sahariah spared no effort to take us around the centre and to brief us on all details. The cost sheet of each dialysis session had to be carefully studied and understood. We then sat down with him to explain that the main intention of our Trust was to bring dialysis treatment within the reach of poor and needy patients." Dr. Sahariah was full of appreciation, but said, "Remember that it is very difficult to sustain a dialysis set-up. Many people have come forward, but gave up within months." Unfazed by his response, the members further discussed the charges of each dialysis, and asked Dr. Sahariah what he would charge us, when compared to other hospitals, if we wished to go ahead with our plan to support deserving patients. He told us that the Mahavir Hospital was charging much less (Rs.1,250) compared to other institutions, and that the fee per dialysis was about Rs.3,500.

Shri Neerup Kothari had already sent the cost details, so the group had everything at their fingertips. The question that remained was what the charges would be if the Trust brought its patients to Mahavir Hospital. Dr. Sahariah finally agreed to bring down the charge to Rs.1,050 (instead of Rs.1,250). He also revealed that he was paying Rs.250 to the Mahavir Hospital for providing the place, and for access to power and water. The alert trustees spotted another opportunity, and met Shri Shanthilal Ji Daga, Chairman of of Mahavir Hospital, and briefed him about the concept of the newly formed Trust. The sole request put forward to him was to do away — for the patients supported by the Trust — with this Rs.250. Shri Daga immediately agreed, saying that both were Jain organizations and that he had no right to deny the request. This was how the per-dialysis rate of Rs.800 was fixed for patients who would be referred by the Bhagwan Mahavir Jain Relief Foundation Trust. The light at the end of the tunnel had never seemed so bright!

Dr. Sahariah was full of appreciation, but said, "Remember that it is very difficult to sustain a dialysis set-up. Many people have come forward, but gave up within months."

The First Dialysis

Satish Khivsara and Gautam Jain both felt it was a celebratory moment. But some mathematics still remained. They first briefed the other trustees about the rate being finally fixed at Rs.800, for treatment at the Mahavir Hospital (only for patients referred by the Trust). Eventually, the sixteen trustees decided that their patients

would have to pay only Rs.300 to the hospital, and the balance Rs.500 would be paid by the Trust to the Mahavir Hospital. The bottomline was clear: a patient covered by the Trust would be relieved of a significant burden — Rs.950 — compared to patients directly approaching the Mahavir Hospital.

In mid-June 2009, the now tightly integrated sixteen trustees met at Shri Inder Jain's office to decide the date for the first dialysis. To start with, they collected Rs.1,000 from each trustee.

Tuesday, 21st July 2009 will remain etched in the Trust's history. Rikab Parak had suggested that it was an auspicious day, a good *muhurth*. Our first patient underwent his dialysis at the Mahavir Hospital. He was identified by Shri Srinivas, the Technician at the hospital. The patient's family was overjoyed to have to pay only Rs.300, instead of the regular charge of Rs.1,250. All sixteen trustess were present, and saw first-hand what the treament involved and what the disease was. As only to be expected, other patients in the hospital quickly came to know about the charitable initiative of the BMJRFT, and began to approach the Trust for support.

The bottomline was clear: a patient covered by the Trust would be relieved of a significant burden — Rs.950 — compared to patients directly approaching the hospital.

An Unstoppable Mission

The elation among the 'Stellar Sixteen' trustees was beyond description. And their families too felt the intense sense of satisfaction and fulfilment on having set in motion a unique social service mission. By the end of July, the Trust had six patients and completed sixteen dialyses. [Within a year, they breezed past 1,600 dialyses... but that is another story].

The spirit of social service is innate to the Jain community. Within a short time, the Trust raised 4.5 lakhs from within the Trustees' circle, in order to take the project forward. Once the Mahavir Hospital project had settled into a steady pace, the trustees (Inder Jain, Satish Khivsara, and Gautam Chand Jain) arranged to meet with Shri Vinay Saboo, Shri Bijay Mandhani and Dr. Shyam Tapadia who were planning to start a dialysis project at the Mahesh Hospital. This resulted in the installation of two machines at the same hospital, which were donated by Shri Nalin Khara and Shri Ram Prakash Bansal.

When two close friends of the Trust, Shri Hemu Bai and Shri Paresh Bhai visited Hyderabad, the dialysis

A Birthday to Remember

On 30th Jan 2012, all BMJRFT trustees assembled at Shri Sunil Pahade's residence at Banjara Hills. After breakfast, they proceeded to Chairman Shri Prakash Shrimal's residence to wish him on his birthday. After cutting the cake, Shri Shrimal expressed his happiness about the progress on the dialysis initiative and gave a cheque for Rs.11 lakhs and said: "I wish to give Rs.11 lakhs for the next five years on my birthday, so that this charity work continues. You must not turn away even one dialysis patient requiring dialysis, irrespective of cast and creed." [Shri Prakash Shrimal passed away on 3rd April 2012. For the next four years, the same amount was paid by his son Shri Prashant Shrimal]



When Shri Babulal Ji Pahade arrived at Shri Shrimal's house, he told the trustees to open a dialysis centre in the Mahavir Hospital & Research Centre, instead of opening in government hospitals. There was some reluctance, because the Mahavir Hospital lease was not extended. Nevertheless, Shri Pahade requested Shri Shrimal and Shri Dhiraj Bhai to convince the trustees. From that day, Shri Dhiraj Bhai kept reminding everyone. One day, he said, "You have to open a centre in Mahavir because it is also our institution, and I will be one of the project donors."



A Diwali Wish

In 2011, on Diwali day, Shri Dhiraj Kapadia called Gautam Jain to wish him, and said, "It is good that we are working with 24 machines, but I'm not happy... We must have at least 108 machines, and a corpus of five crores." Gautam Jain responded, in a lighter vein, that this 'small wish' was actually difficult to realize.

Two years later, on 1st April 2013, Shri Dhiraj Bhai's son Sushil called up Inder Chand Jain, "Dad wants to meet you and Gautam Bhai at the Omega Hospital... he is in the ICU." When the duo rushed to the hospital, Shri Kapadia was very happy: "I don't think I have much longer to live... Let me bless you both. Take good care of the Trust. I am happy that you have agreed to open a dialysis centre at Mahavir Hospital with 24 machines." [Shri Dhiraj Kapadia expired that very afternoon]

project was discussed in detail, and they floated the idea that a large-scale programme could be organised for general awareness and donation-collection. Shri Paresh Bhai suggested that the famous singer Shri Roop Kumar Rathod could be invited to provide entertainment. The outcome was our very first event 'Jagrati – An Awakening', which took place on 14th March 2010 at the Lalitha Kala Thoranam, Hyderabad. Invitation was restricted and by free passes only.

The chief guests of honour that evening were Shri Navin Mittal, then Collector of Hyderabad, and Shri Deepak Bhai. The screening of a short film on dialysis patients, created by Shri Sanjay Kankaria, was one of the highlights of the evening. Needless to say, the event was a grand success. Apart from huge cash donations, generous donors pledged 24 dialysis machines... far more than what the Trust had ever dreamed of.

Shri Navin Mittal subsequently initiated the process to identify spare space for the Trust to set up its own dialysis facility. Eventually, on 13th December 2010, the State Government issued an order giving the Trust rent-free space in the King Koti District Hospital, right in the centre of the city. The order was issued by Dr. P.V. Ramesh, IAS (Retd.), then Principal Secretary, Health, Medical and Family Welfare, Government of Andhra Pradesh. The entire preparatory work culminating in the issue of the order was done by Shri B. Venkatesham, IAS, then Managing Director, Andhra Pradesh Medical Infrastructure Development Corporation.

The King Koti centre of the BMJRFT began functioning in April 2011, and heralded a new chapter in the annals of the Trust. Several other centres were established in the years that followed, as described elsewhere in this book. Even today — twelve years and a million dialyses later — Gautam Jain and Satish Khivsara have just one thing to say: "We have miles to go before we sleep... as service to mankind is service to God!"


Individual commitment to a group effort... this is the biggest key to success. Alone we can do so little; together we can do so much.


I have been associated with the Trust from Day One, and am really proud that we have sailed past the 'One Millionth Dialysis' milestone; it has been a most satisfying experience.



THE JOURNEY BEGINS

- The Bhagwan Mahavir Jain Relief Foundation Trust was registered on 12th June 2009.
- The very first dialysis was done on 21st July 2009 at the Mahavir Hospital and Research Centre.
- In July 2009, sixteen dialyses were performed.
- Coupons were handed out to patients (dialysis and medicines) at 'Vardhman', our registered office at Jambagh.

When the Bhagwan Mahavir Jain Relief Foundation Trust (BMJRFT) became a reality in 2009, it performed its first dialysis at the well-known Mahavir Hospital. Within months, however, the need to be in total control of the entire dialysis operation was acutely felt.

Members of the Trust found that a corner of the District Hospital, King Koti, was under-utilized, and approached the Government. In appreciation of the Trust's charitable intentions, the State Government eventually offered rent-free space in the this hospital, in central Hyderabad. It was a magnanimous gesture, and it allowed the Trust to set up its very own, state-of-art dialysis centre with 24 dialysis machines. But Hyderabad was rapidly expanding, and patients had to travel long distances to reach the congested King Koti area, apart from the fact that more and more needy patients were approaching the Trust for assistance. The Trust had the foresight to plan centres in different locations of the twin cities, so that patients could get their dialyses done within a short distance from their place of residence, helping them save both time and money. In the course of the decade, various hospitals or medical centres generously offered space, within their premises, for the Trust to set up its dialysis operations.

The following pages recount the BMJRFT's momentous journey year through year, with details of each new centre opened, as well as photographs of the memorable events that brought together innumerable well-wishers and distinguished donors. The year's highlights and key statistics are offered on the opening page for that year. The eight *Bhagwan Mahavir Dialysis Centres* (and their extension facilities) are therefore frequently known by their location or host medical centre: King Koti Centre, District Government Hospital (2011); Ramdev Rao Hospital Kukatpally Centre (2012); Mahavir Hospital Centre (2013); Ramdev Rao, Kukatpally Expansion (2015); Bhagwan Mahavir Physiotherapy Centre (2015);

Mahavir Hospital RVD Block (2015); Guru Nanak Secunderabad Centre (2016); King Koti Expansion (2016); Ramdev Rao Kukatpally Expansion 2 (2018); Mahavir Hospital Expansion (2018); ZOI Hospitals Attapur Centre (2018); Challa Hospital Ameerpet Centre (2019); Indo-US Hospital Malakpet Centre (2019); CHC Alair Centre (2020, in the Covid pandemic period).

Another initiative of the BMJRFT has been to partner with the following local hospitals to facilitate the patients to go for dialysis closer to their residences, so that they could save time and money: C.C. Shroff Memorial Hospital, Barkatpura; Eashwar Lakshmi Hospital, Gandhi Nagar; Sri Sankalp Hospital, Nagarjuna Sagar Road, Hastinapuram; Metrocure Hospital, Malakpet.

It is important to note how the Trust's key achievements have unfolded over the years, thanks to unfailing support from our patients, donors, the Government of Telangana, and our well-wishers worldwide, finally bringing us to the incredible "One Million".

JAGRATI – AN AWAKENING

Effect of Arham Purushakar Meditation in Symptomatic Improvement in Patients with Renal End Stage Disease on Hemodialysis Therapy - Case Series

Abstract:

The study was undertaken to ascertain if a short term intervention of ArhamPurushakar Meditation (APM) results in the improvement of clinical conditions of patients with renal end stage disease on hemodialysis. The study was conducted at Bhagwan Mahavir Dialysis Centre (A Unit Of Bhagwan Mahavir Jain Relief Foundatio Trust) in association with Bhagwan Mahavir Medical Research Centre (BMMRC) after obtaining the approval of the Institutional Ethics Committee (Registration Number of IEC ECR/450/Inst/AP/20131RR-16). 111 Patients with end stage renal disease the age group of 25-65 years was enrolled for the study after obtaining their consent for participation. Then patients were categorized into meditation group with 64 patients and control group with 47 patients. The meditation group practiced meditation for three months and the control group received only hemodialysis. The patients who practiced meditation regularly showed improvement in their health problems such as Appetite, Lack of sleep, muscular cramps, vomiting, swelling of face and legs, hypertension, Control Diabetics, General Health condition etc. Thus this study presented evidence for the beneficial effects of short term intervention of APM on the general health conditions of the patients suffering from renal end stage diseases.

Introduction:

Arham Purushakar Meditation is a unique, universal, but simple, easy to follow method of meditation technique revived from Agamas and developed by Jain Upadhyay Param Pujya Shri.Praveen Rishiji.This technique of meditation uses the visible spectrum of colours to cure diseases.

THE CHALLENGE OF COVID-19

For the BMJRFT, the unexpected spread of Covid-19 was a challenge within a challenge. When a nationwide lockdown was announced by the government on 23rd March 2020, it was the worst nightmare that our patients and our centres had ever imagined.

Within no time, many of our worried staff members went away to their native places, leaving only around 60% staff to run the dialysis units. The Trust had to take quick decisions and make emergency arrangements. Since no patient can live without regular dialysis, access to the treatment centres became crucial. Our Chairman Shri P.C. Parakh called up the Chief Minister's office and told them about the problems specific to dialysis patients. We will always be thankful to the Government for having acceded to our request: in spite of the no-go routes, the authorities allowed our patients and staff to reach the dialysis centres on showing their ID card.

Throughout the pandemic, our centres worked hard to ensure that no patient lost his or her life due to denial of treatment. We also remain indebted to our suppliers who saw to it that consumables and medicines reached us without a hitch.

Government regulations did not permit us to offer dialysis for patients who had tested positive for Covid-19. They had no option but to go to government-run hospitals. After they recovered and tested negative, private hospitals began to charge them up to Rs.8,000 per dialysis... When the trustees heard this, they immediately decided to dedicate a 10-machine facility, with separate staff, exclusively for such Covid-recovered patients. Moreover, the Trust decided to charge them only Rs.200, including all disposables. Patients thus saved Rs.7,800 per dialysis. Many individuals were thus saved from financial ruin.

When the second Covid wave hit, the Bhagwan Mahavir Dialysis Centres were once again ready: two machines at Mahavir Hospital were reserved for patients who had tested positive. The rate was kept at Rs.200, while other hospitals charged between Rs.8,000 to Rs.10,000. Eventually, an entire centre was set aside for recovered patients. Our staff patiently went through the innumerable police checks and reported for duty throughout the pandemic.

The Trust's senior dialysis therapists, Shri Chary and Shri Rukma Reddy continuously monitored the smooth running of our centres in such tough times. Trustees too regularly visited the centres and spared no effort to make sure all systems ran normally. BMJRFT's nephrologists, Dr Rajaram, Dr Ranganath and Dr Shashidar were given Covid guidence on how to take precautions during dialysis and screening of patients.

Alair is rapidly developing as an important town, home to the 2,000-year-old Kolanupaka Jain Temple. The Bhagwan Mahavir Dialysis Centre here is located at the Government Community Health Centre. It was inaugurated on 28th June 2020 by Shri G. Jagadish Reddy, Energy Minister, Telangana. The project was sponsored by Dr. Amar and Dr. Kailash Gupta.

It is worth noting that the spadework for this centre continued even during the Covid-19 lockdown of early 2020. And the facility opened within a month after it was lifted.






Hemodialysis involves a number of demanding manual operations on the dialysis machine. Shown here are two typical monitor screen displays. All important treatment values are represented graphically on the LCD monitor, which gives an overview of the ongoing treatment and history. Every function is monitored, including the pump speed, blood pressure and dialysate temperature. The therapists/technicians constantly check to make sure the dialysis session is safe and effective. The machine automatically sounds an alert if anything needs attention. If the power goes off while the machine is working, it will automatically close all the lines. Information about the ongoing session is stored using a backup battery.

BMJRFT-INSPIRED CENTRES

Within a few years of the Bhagwan Mahavir Jain Relief Foundation Trust setting up its first dialysis centre in Hyderabad, the model was not only greatly appreciated by the local public, but the news travelled fast to other urban agglomerations. Soon, the BMJRFT began to receive requests from social service inclined charitable organisations across the country seeking advice and guidance. Listed below are fourteen centres inspired by the BMJRFT. As a dialysis professional put it, "One day, 'Bhagwan Mahavir' will become synonymous with healthcare, and more specifically, with dialysis treatment..."

SHREE JAIN HOSPITAL & RESEARCH CENTRE, HOWRAH

A WORD FROM OUR PATIENTS



Life-giving support often comes from the strangest of corners. Had it not been for the timely help from the Bhagwan Mahavir Jain Relief Foundation Trust, I would perhaps not even been alive today.

In mid-2017, I suddenly fainted while on duty at the Secuderabad Club. It turned out that by blood pressure had shot up to 220, and my creatinine level was at 31. After a spending a day at a nearby hospital, I was referred to a nephrologist. An acute renal failure was confirmed both my kidneys had failed — and I was immediate put on dialysis via a catheter on the jugular (near the neck). In just about three weeks, my medical bill, without including medicines, came to Rs.1,65,000. The dialysis alone costed about Rs.40,000. Although I was subsequently discharged and resumed work, the financial shock was extreme.

One evening, I shared my plight with a guest at the Club while I was on duty as the event manager. On his advice, I approached the Bhagwan Mahavir Dialysis Centre at Ramdevrao Hospital, Kukatpally, and was in for a most pleasant surprise: I was told that the charge per visit would be only Rs.300. I could hardly believe my eyes! I have now been in the care of BMJRFT for the last four years, and am happy that their professionalism, guidance and hygiene is far superior to what I had experienced in the expensive private hospitals. I wish to record my sincere thanks to all the Trustees and committee members, the technicians and the staff for all the support and assistance. -S. Subhash Reddy. [Shri S. 'Living legends, beautiful souls on earth in human form, examples of humanity'... there is no end to the tributes one can give to the Trustees of the BMJRFT. Eleven years ago, I had thought that I had lost everything, that my life (at 23) was already shutting down. It was at such a juncture that support from BMJRFT trustees — more importantly the faith and motivation they instilled in me — brought me back from the brink.

It was in Dec 2010 that chronic renal failure made my urea and creatinine go through the roof. When I was told that dialysis was the only way out, for the rest of my life, me and my entire family simply broke down. My very first month of dialysis and hospitalization left me with a Rs.64,000 bill. My health took a severe beating, with high BP, shortness of breath, vomiting, fatigue, general weakness and lack of appetite resulting in me losing 20 kg in a single month. Then followed a series of setbacks leading to multiple ICU and critical-care admissions for various issues with the lungs, heart and the brain too. A host of other complications, including prolonged tuberulosis took me to the brink — emotional breakdown, physical and psychological weakness, depression, panic disorders, and behavioral complications... my medical file had it all. After my renal failure, I could not go back to my job as a medical transcriptor. I eventually lost my job. Fate seemed completely stacked up against me, when, in the midst of all this, I had to even face a divorce. It was at such a point that a friend referred me to BMJRFT.



The dialysis at just Rs.300, the warmth and loving care of the nurses and technicians, the gentleness of the trustees, and the very hygienic set-up, all gave me renewed hope in life. After four years at the Bhagwan Mahavir Dialysis Centre, life began to look up, and I managed to find a job that allowed me to work from home. By mid-2014, my social life slowly restarted. A miracle happened in Jan 2017 — I underwent a kidney transplant at NIMS, under the Jeevanandan Cadaver Transplant scheme. It was a success entirely because the quality dialyses at BMJRFT had kept my other organs in good health, leaving me fit for kidney transplantation. I can write a book about how the BMJRFT changed my life. And there would be a separate chapter for every one of the beautiful people there... may God bless them for eternity. — Nusrath Bequin.

The BMJRFT has signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the Lions Life Charitable Trust for the settip of the *Kompella Dialysis Centre*, at Cherlapally, about 25 km south of Hyderabad city.

A proposal is being studied for the setting up of a dialysis centre at Suchitra Circle, Kompally (Hyderabad), in association with the Rotary Club of Secunderabad Sunrise. Kompally is a thickly populated residential area where there is no dialysis facility anywhere nearby.
